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Question: 1

As used in the passage, what does the word "depressed" most nearly mean?

- A. Very unhappy

Answer: D

Explanation:

"Depressed" is used in the passage to describe how a plunger is pushed down to make it work. "Very unhappy" is not an action, and it is also not logical for the plunger to be decreased, so choices A and B can be eliminated. The passage also says that when the plunger is depressed, air moves. If the user exhaled on the plunger, this would not cause the air inside the cup to move, so choice C is incorrect.

Question: 2

Which word in the passage shows that the plunger is depressed and air is pushed out at the same time?

- A. Out
- B. Continued
- C. As
- D. Causes

Answer: C

Explanation:

As is the only word of these choices that indicates that or more events are happening simultaneously. Out is a preposition, and it does not indicate the sequence of events. Continued can describe the duration of an event, but it does not show the order of events. Causes can indicate the order of events, as an event that causes an effect must occur first, but it does not show that two events happened at the same time.

Question: 3

This passage describes characters' feelings in Madame Butterfly as all of the following EXCEPT:

- A. Romantic
- B. Poignant
- C. Tragic
- D. Musical

Answer: D

Explanation:

Although this passage describes an opera, the feelings experienced by the characters would not be considered musical. The passage does mention that the American officer falls in love with Butterfly, so it is reasonable to describe the characters' feelings as romantic. Poignant and tragic both refer to feelings of intense emotional distress, which are expressed through both Butterfly and the officer's reactions at the end of the passage. These terms clearly describe the characters' feelings, making musical the correct answer.

Question: 4

What is the purpose of the italicized text in the passage?

- A. To show Madame Butterfly's thoughts
- B. To emphasize an idea
- C. To format a heading
- D. To indicate the title of the opera

Answer: D

Explanation:

The passage is describing the events of an opera titled Madame Butterfly. The opera title is given in the first sentence of the passage, and since an opera is a major work, its title should be italicized in typed text. The first sentence simply gives the name of the opera and the writer, it does not introduce an important idea or a section heading, so choices B and C are incorrect. None of the characters thoughts or dialogue are quoted in the passage, so choice A is also incorrect.

Question: 5

According to the passage, which of the following are reasons an audio recording device can be superior to taking notes by hand during an interview? (Select all that apply.)

- A. A recording device may be low on batteries without the journalist noticing.
- B. Efficient, legible note-taking is a difficult skill to master.
- C. The journalist has to look away from the interview subject to write notes.
- D. Recording devices capture only what is said, ignoring non-verbal cues.
- E. Taking notes by hand does not require any advanced technology.

Answer: B,C

Explanation:

The passage mentions advantages and disadvantages to both processes. Note-taking is described as being difficult to do efficiently and legibly, and it carries with it the necessity for frequently looking away from the interview subject. Choices A and E, on the other hand, are reasons that note-taking may be superior to audio recording. Technology can fail unexpectedly, causing information to be lost. Choice D alludes to a potential drawback of both methods, namely that non-verbal cues may be missed.

Question: 6

Which of the following are examples of body language or non-verbal cues as described in the passage? (Select all that apply.)

- A. A surprised look
- B. Rubbing hands together
- C. A quiet answer
- D. An angry expression
- E. A trembling voice
- F. A nodding head

Answer: A,B,D,F

Explanation:

In the passage, the first paragraph gives two examples of body language when it describes an interview subject closing his eyes and trembling slightly. A surprised look rubbing hands together, an angry expression, and a nodding head are all examples of body language or non-verbal cues that could be missed if the journalist is looking down to take notes instead of looking at the interview subject. A quiet answer would be heard rather than seen, as would a trembling voice.

Question: 7

Which statement from the passage best supports the conclusion that taking notes and recording audio during an interview is a good practice for journalists?

- A. Journalists often use a recording device to capture the audio transcript of an interview with a subject.
- B. Relying on a recording device is not without troubles, however.
- C. As a result, a portion of an interview can be lost without anyway to reclaim it.
- D. This dual-note method means that most of the time, a wise journalist has good resources to use as he or she writes the article draft.

Answer: D

Explanation:

Choice D states that wise journalists both record audio and take hand-written notes during interviews so that they have a backup resource in case the recording or notes are not reliable.

Choice A simply states the purpose of recording devices but does not give enough information to support the conclusion that journalists should both record audio and take notes. Choices B and C show that recording audio is not always reliable, but neither of these choices shows why it is a good practice.

Question: 8

Which title is the best choice for this passage?

- A. "The Art of Writing Notes"
- B. "Conducting an Interview"
- C. "Recording an Interview"
- D. "Problems with Interviews"

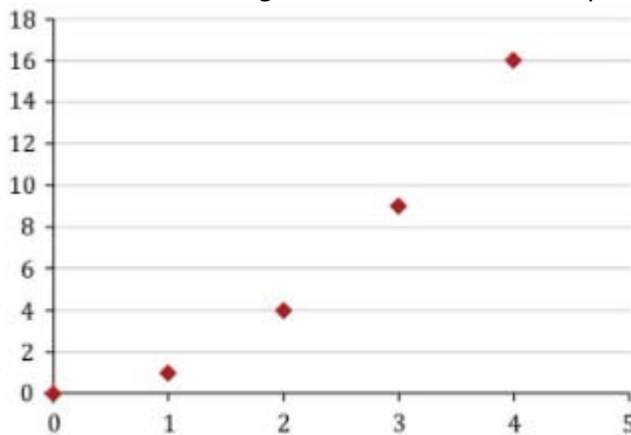
Answer: C

Explanation:

"Recording an Interview" is relevant to each section of the passage. The passage includes details related to writing notes, but since this is not the main idea, choice A is not the best choice. Conducting an interview is only one part of interviewing, so choice B is too broad for this passage. The passage also only talks about problems that occur when taking notes, not problems with interviews in general, so choice D is also not the best title.

Question: 9

Which of the following best describes the data represented by this scatterplot?



- A. This is a linear association with a positive correlation between bivariate data.
- B. This is a linear association with a negative correlation between bivariate data.
- C. This is a nonlinear association between bivariate data.
- D. There is no association between the bivariate data.

Answer: C

Explanation:

The data points in this scatter plot form a curve. This is a nonlinear association. Therefore, choice C is correct.

Question: 10

If Stella's current weight is 56 kilograms, which of the following is her approximate weight in pounds?
(Note: 1 kilogram is approximately equal to 2.2 pounds.)

- A. 123 pounds
- B. 110 pounds
- C. 156 pounds
- D. 137 pounds

Answer: A

Explanation:

To find the correct answer, multiply Stella's weight in kilograms by the conversion factor for kilograms to pounds.

$$\frac{56 \text{ kg}}{1} \times \frac{2.2 \text{ lb}}{1 \text{ kg}} = 123.2 \text{ lb} \approx 123 \text{ lb}$$

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
